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Executive Officer Hits the Ground Running

The newly appointed Executive Officer, Tony Irvine commenced the expanded EO role on 18th March 2013. Sixty percent of his time is spent on the EPLGA business as usual and forty percent on the LGA of SA "Outreach Services" pilot program. To date he has worked at familiarising himself with the various programs and support services provided by the LGA and its entities and

identifying issues that Councils may be facing and undertaking an assessment of the support that the LGA could provide to assist in resolution of the issues, in the early stages. An annual works program will be developed in collaboration with the regions CEO's & the LGA's Executive Officer, Wendy Campana. A part of the planning is to connect Councils with services that they seek

from the LGA, including providing feedback to the LGA about refinements and adjustments to the services that are required. To allow the pilot to be given every opportunity to succeed it will be critical that an annual engagement program is established that is consistent with the priorities of the Councils in the region and the LGA of SA.

RDA Whyalla & Eyre Peninsula Funding

All member Councils are aware of the State's withdrawal of core funding to the RDAWEP which has placed pressure back onto them to make up the shortfall. The three year funding agreement is being reviewed to ensure the region has a fully functional economic development board that is able to meet its vision and goals and ultimately assisting the region to "win" its fair share or more of new development and jobs. Negotiating a new agreement with 11 Councils, State

Government & Federal Government as signatories can be difficult at the best of times. However with our region on the cusp of many "once in a life time" opportunities the current negotiation situation calls for integrity on behalf of all parties and some real regional leadership including regional team work. Whilst we can all continue to complain about the State's decisions on this matter, it is the region which has the most to lose. Like never before the EPLGA

member Councils have to be verv clear in what it expects of the RDAWEP and the RDAWEP like never before needs to engage the EPLGA Councils in a partnership where our region can meet its aspirations and doals to ensure we keep our future in own collective hands and not be dictated by others from afar. The RDAWEP was proclaimed by Michael O'Niell (SACES) at the Elliston EPLGA Conference, as one of Australia's top four RDA performers.

Fire & Emergency Services Act Review



A regional submission was prepared and forwarded to Paul Holloway in relation to the FESA Review. The submission was developed through consultation & written responses from Councils throughout the region. Through this process a "majority" position was taken when collating all the council responses. Individual Councils with different views to the "majority" were recommended to present their views as a single Council response. Reference in the submission was made on increasing penalties, improving the burning permit processes, seeking more land holder input into the Bushfire Management Committees, better consultation with Council management, specifying the Fire Prevention Officer's role and authority in the regulations and the absence of other agencies planning for emergency situations. Whilst not in the EPLGA's submission the Executive Officer in meeting with Paul Holloway was alerted to some submissions recommending that the Harvest Voluntary Code of Conduct be made mandatory.

Rural Addressing Congratulations from CFS

Kevin May, Executive Officer, Region 6 Volunteer Management Committee congratulated those Councils which have fully introduced rural addressing. Volunteers have reported to him that where the scheme is fully in place, their job of locating a fire or other emergency is made much easier, allowing them a greater opportunity for earlier intervention during an incident. He encourages those Councils yet to fully implement such a scheme to do so at their earliest convenience. This overcomes the confusing mixture of lot numbers and street numbers in some zones known as townships or rural living areas. Time is of the essence when emergency services are called to save life and/or property.

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Jobs Summit

The Eyre Peninsula Skills and Workforce Summit, recently held at Wudinna provided the opportunity for the regions key industries and Local Governments to meet face to face and listen to each other's current and future workforce needs. The input provided by the Summit participants and the invited speakers highlighted some necessary improvements and innovative solutions to attraction and retention strategies and industry related training models so that skill sets are developed that are relevant to the Eyre Region.

Federal Member for Grey's Position sought on Referendum

The EPLGA has sought support from Rowan Ramsey, Federal Member for Grey in relation to constitutional recognition for Local Government. Australian Local Government Association (ALGA) President Felicityann Lewis has declared that the national campaign to convince Australians to vote 'yes' to include local government in the Constitution to secure funding for local services and infrastructure will intensify now that the Federal Government has given its commitment to a September 2013 referendum.

"The Government's decision to support holding a referendum at the time of the September federal election is the signal we have been waiting for to carry forward our fight to protect federal funding for councils," Mayor Lewis said.

"We now need bipartisan support and I call on the Opposition, and all political parties, to support the referendum proposal and referendum funding legislation, when it is debated in Parliament next week.

"We have recently advertised for a National Campaign Director to lead an integrated campaign involving every council across the country.

"As we have argued for many years, the only way to protect direct federal funding for community services and infrastructure is to have local government recognised in the Australian Constitution.

"Councils want financial certainty. They need formal recognition as legitimate recipients of direct federal funding. Without it, funding under programs such as Roads to Recovery are at risk of High Court challenge.

Court "Recent High decisions in the Pape Case and Williams Case, which both considered the power of the Commonwealth to provide direct funding to entities included in the not Constitution, onlv strengthen our case to formalise the Commonwealth's arrangements for funding councils directly.

"So much has been done to advance the case for constitutional recognition of local government and our efforts have received considerable support. We have been encouraged by final recommendations of both the Expert Panel on Constitutional Recognition of Local Government and the Federal *Parliamentary* Joint Select Committee on *Constitutional* Recognition of Local Government, which supported and endorsed 2013 financial а recognition referendum.

"As I have said on numerous occasions, local government wants to win this referendum

which is in the interests of every local community. We accept that getting a referendum passed will be a major challenge. But local governments across the country support the financial recognition option and are committed to working hard within their local communities to get a referendum on the question of financial recognition passed by the majority of voters in the majority of states."

Federal Member, Rowan Ramsey has indicated he not oppose the will referendum position of government local and stated "| have no particular problem with the proposal and will not be it, however opposing having spoken to quite a number of councillors about the issue, I am not completely convinced they fullv understand this amendment the to Constitution does not guarantee funding, only Commonwealth's the ability to provide funding if it wishes.

Only last year I was lobbied by local government to make sure the Roads to Recovery Grants were preserved. They were at risk then as they will be at any time in the future should any government decide to reduce or remove them. The constitutional change does not address any right of local government to finance.

Having said that, I see little down-side."

The interim reports identify current infrastructure gaps, project future mining growth, and identify current and future infrastructure needs. It has also identified a list of potential infrastructure projects that respond to the key issues across the region.
